


Here are Emma's top tips for giving your kitchen a stylish, homely aesthetic to enjoy every day.

designer's note:

Shiny, showroom kitchens are often designed to include lots of hard surfaces and appliances for the wow factor, but they can often feel too sterile in real homes.

Try styling your shelves with favourite objects, adding a rich wall colour or a statement splashback to warm things up. You can still keep things clean and minimal or be bold and maximalist whilst maintaining the integrity of your kitchen design.

kitchen planning checklist

If you're working on the design of a new kitchen, here's a handy checklist full of **Emma's** top tips.

Print it out to help you plan!

Create a moodboard of all the kitchens you like. You can organise them by theme with Pinterest or cut and stick your favourites. Dream big, ideas can be interpreted to suit your budget.	
Think about what you really want , what is non-negotiable and what is nice to have?	
Decide on your budget .	
Get some quotes , don't forget to explore independent kitchen showrooms that aren't always more expensive and can be great overall value for money.	
Choose your kitchen designer or builder . Pick someone who really understands your needs and that you feel you can work with. A new kitchen is a big project so a good relationship that has natural synergy is crucial.	
When you have an overall design, your kitchen designer will be able to advise you on whether any of your key services need to be moved. You might need help from a builder, plumber or electrician. Fully fitted kitchen companies sometimes project manage these aspects for you and charge accordingly.	
Once you have your kitchen design sorted you can think about the flooring , splashbacks, cabinet and paint colours. Emma's recommendation: think about these as early in the process as you can.	

Hire your tradespeople or instruct your fitted kitchen company.

For **splashbacks**, think about whether you're having **up-stands**? And if you need to move any sockets or have taps fitted before or after for an easy splashback installation.

Think about lead-times, so you can co-ordinate all the elements.

Once your dream kitchen is installed, live with it for a little while and then start adding in the fun bits, stylish touches and accessories!
